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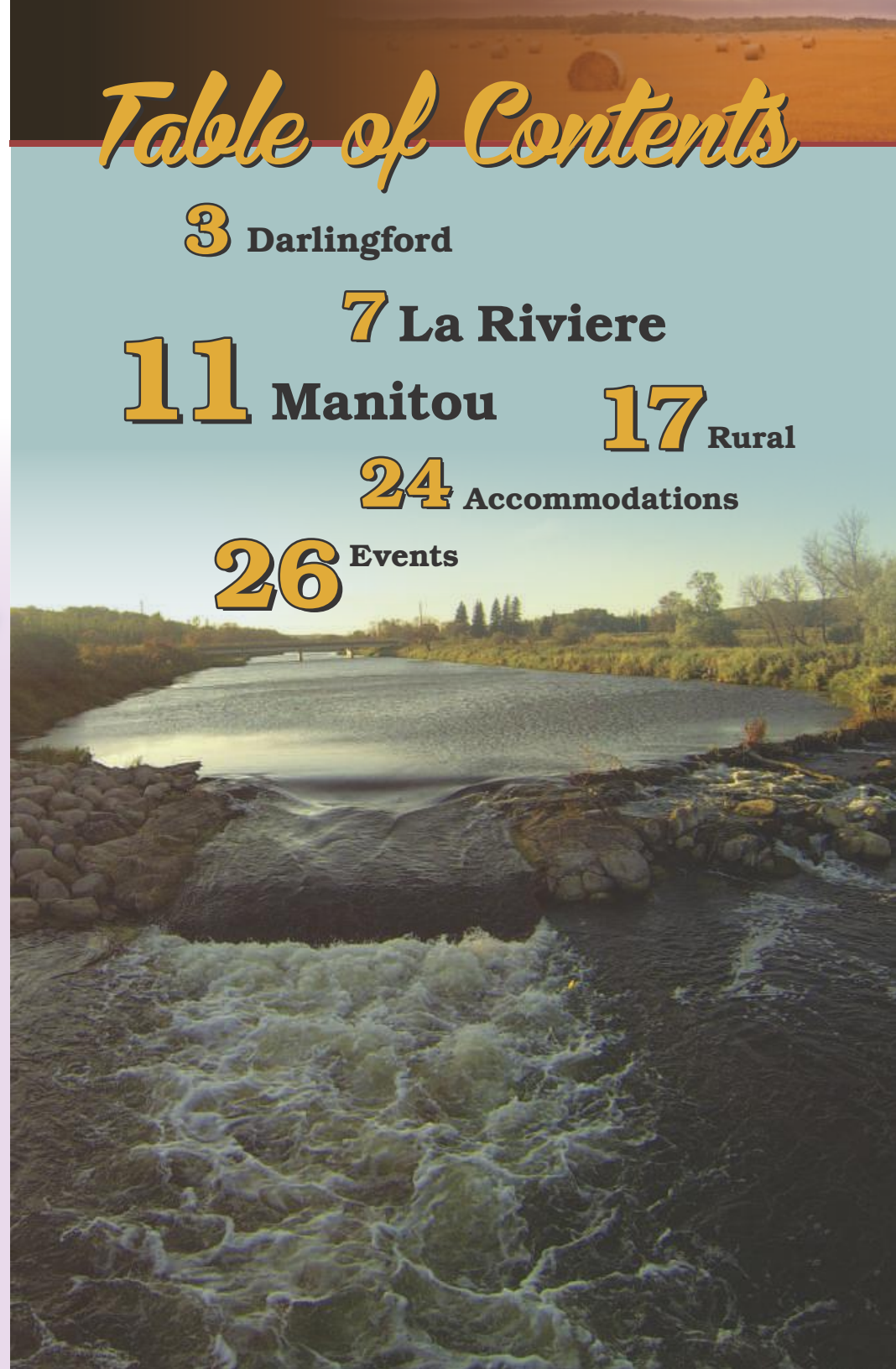
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DARLINGFORD

Darlingford – One of the Municipality of Pembina's LUDs, Darlingford has much to offer. Nestled in the heart of Southern Manitoba, opportunities for recreation are numerous. This is one rural community you will want to pull off the main highway to explore. In the summer months, among the many gardens of flowers welcoming everyone, all planted and cared for by the caring people of the community, you will also find some very unique historic attractions in this small community. There is a great playground for the children if they are needing to stretch their legs and blow off some steam.

Attractions

DARLINGFORD MEMORIAL PARK

The War Memorial was dedicated in 1921 in memory of the Veterans of the Great War 1914-1918. Veterans at the end of World War II were also honored. This is the only free-standing memorial building in Manitoba with the sole purpose of commemorating the war dead. Inside the memorial are two black marble tablets which bear the names of the men and women who served and died in World War I and II. The magnitude of human loss and suffering during the Great War resulted in the erection of memorial cenotaphs, statuary and tablets throughout Manitoba.

In 1921 Darlingford and the surrounding district commemorated their military efforts by constructing this small Gothic-inspired memorial building and park. The tranquil setting of the memorial and park evokes a spirit of hope and remembrance in stark contrast with the battlefields of Europe. It was the inspiration of Ferris Bolton, a pioneer farmer and politician from Darlingford, whose three sons were killed in France in 1917.

The memorial was designed by Arthur A. Stoughton, the first head of the School of Architecture at the University of Manitoba. The Morden Experimental Farm designed and landscaped the park. Dr. W.R. Leslie, the Farm's superintendent, tended the park for many years. Beginning in 1921, an annual Memorial service has been held on the first Sunday in July. Many generations of the Veterans' descendants and others participate in the service. Traditionally a young child places a flower on one of the crosses during roll call for each soldier from the Darlingford area that gave his life during the two World Wars. After each flower is secured, a cross is formed by participants who stand for the last post and two minutes of silence. Everyone is welcome to attend this very moving service.

The park is now maintained by a dedicated group of community volunteers who spend countless hours planting and maintaining hundreds of flowers. The grounds are open to visitors any time.





DARLINGFORD CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL

Darlingford Consolidated School, now a museum, is a proud standing two-storey rectangular structure built on the limits of Darlingford in 1909-10, and stands adjacent to the village's curling rink and Memorial Park. The brick-veneer facility is on a large grassed and treed lot, with residences to the east and open fields to the west.

Darlingford Consolidated School provides an important physical connection to early attempts at rural school consolidation in Manitoba. Experimental facilities such as this formed the roots of the process -- substantial buildings established at centralized locations to provide graded classrooms, specialized teaching and an improved curriculum. With its modest classical detailing and simple proportions, the Darlingford School retains its standardized interior layout with a four-classroom school. Completed in stages, the school began as a one-storey two-classroom facility that grew to a two-storey structure in 1921, accommodating upper grades on the main floor and primary pupils on the second level.



LA VERENDRYE WAYSIDE PARK

located at the Junction of PTH 3 and PR 31 just east of Darlingford, MB. - The idea of building LaVerendrye National Historic Park was because LaVerendrye was actually the first Canadian to traverse and explore this part of Manitoba. It was established that they passed within a mile of the present site of Darlingford in 1738. This party of fifty men consisted of soldiers, voyageurs, traders, Canadian trappers, and native Indians, who knew the country well.

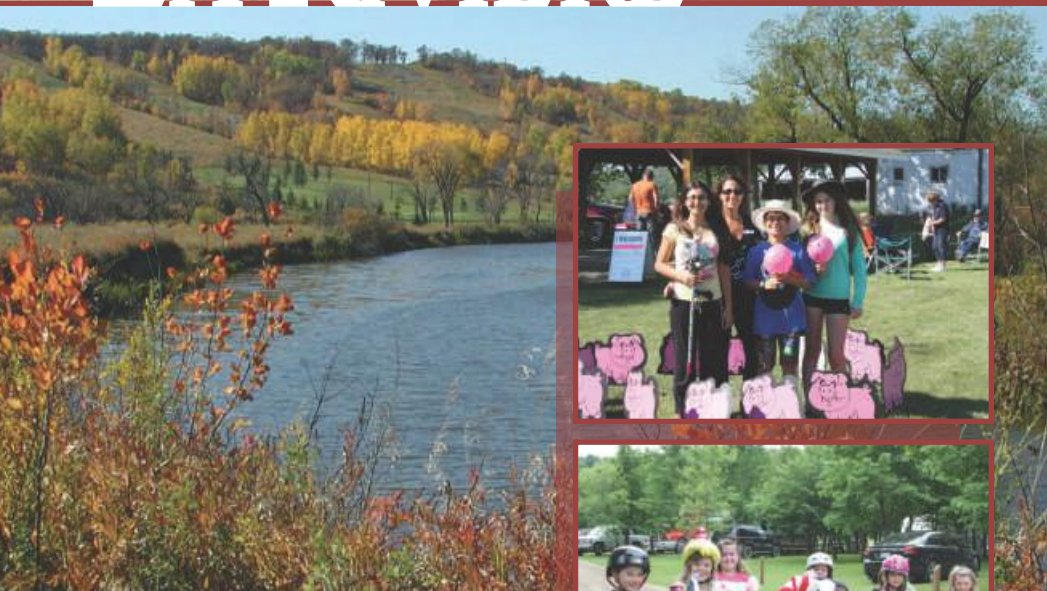


ZION CALVIN UNITED CHURCH

Zion Calvin United Church was designated a Municipal Heritage site March 28, 2011. Built in 1908, it is a well-preserved example of the type of simple wood-frame Gothic Revival Church that served growing Manitoba communities as they made their transition from pioneer settlements to established communities. Basically L-shaped in plan, it has a fine bell tower that is a landmark in its small community and still offers regular services year round.



LA RIVIERE



Located in the beautiful Pembina Valley, La Riviere boasts a variety of business and recreational opportunities, within the convenience and comfort of a small town.

Travelers will enjoy the many experiences offered at La Riviere since the early 1900's. For decades, ski trains brought ski enthusiasts to the oldest ski resort in Manitoba. Skiers from many destinations continue to enjoy the downhill and cross-country trails still offered at the modern Holiday Mountain Resort.

Hunters and photographers alike stalk their prey in the Pembina Valley with its abundance of wildlife. Travelers can have their photo taken at the Wild Turkey statue, built to commemorate the community's centennial in 1986. La Riviere is not only a haven in the winter with miles of groomed trails for the snowmobile buff, but hikers, bikers and canoeist alike find the hills and winding Pembina River a challenge in the summer.

HOLIDAY MOUNTAIN RESORT

Location: Follow PTH 3 to La Riviere. The ski resort is located on the south west side of town. Whether you're an alpine skier, a cross-country skier or a snowboarder, there's plenty for you at Holiday Mountain. Alpine skiing at Holiday Mountain is as good as it gets in Manitoba.

The ski facilities are comprised of two double chair lifts and magic carpet with a total uphill capacity of 5000 people per hour. The Terrain Park continues to be modified. Holiday Mountain now has a large table-top as well as a small table-top, along with 3 different rails including a rainbow rail. If you're a beginner, the Holiday Mountain Ski School offers instruction for young and old alike. The resort offers ski and snowboard lessons designed for individuals or groups. The school programs, of course are famous with schoolchildren, teachers and parents all over Manitoba.

OAK VALLEY OUTDOOR THEATRE AND RECREATION SITE

Located 1km east of La Riviere on PTH 3. If you're coming from the East, look for the Oak Valley entrance on your right (north).

The middle two weeks of July see the tiny little hamlet of La Riviere become the region's centre of activity, as the renowned Oak Valley Productions stage their annual Passion Play at its picturesque outdoor theatre

MB WWI MUSEUM

Located 3 miles west of La Riviere, Manitoba; turn off PTH 3 at Municipal Road 58 West, then travel one mile north to 16 North. Turn right, then turn right into the first farm yard on the right side of the road. WWI Museum is a non-profit museum dedicated to the memory of Manitobans in the Great War 1914-1918. We are very proud of our extensive library and archives that are offered to the researcher of the Great War. On display we have medals, uniforms, equipment and panoramic photographs that adorn the walls of this museum. Phone 204-825-2961. Open weekends only May - Sept.

MANITOU OPERA HOUSE

Located at 325 Main St. The Manitou Opera House, built in 1930 with Arts and Crafts influenced architecture, has a proscenium stage, a partially sloped auditorium and a four-step balcony. The house holds 385 patrons for concerts and will seat 100 for small banquets. Be sure to check out the website for the next musical production, coffee house or concert! 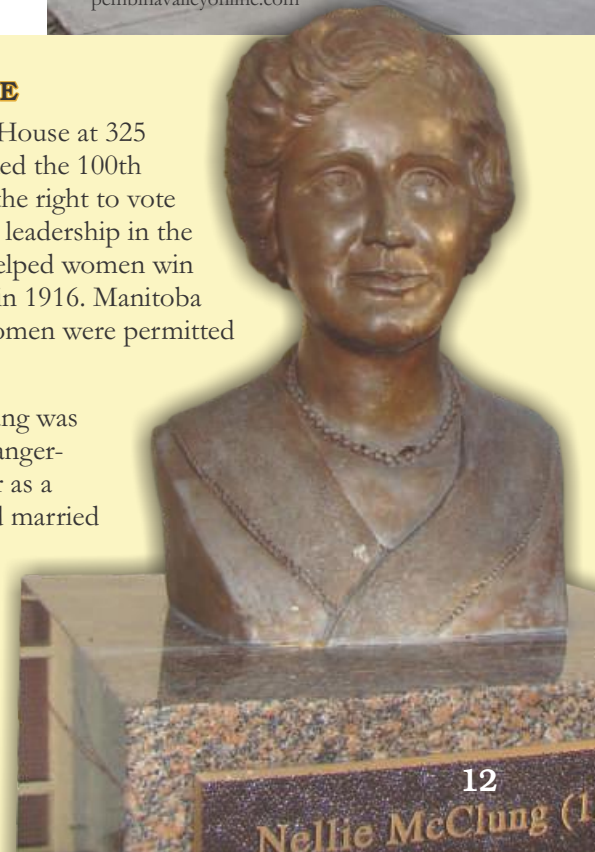

NELLIE MCCLUNG STATUE

Located in front of the Opera House at 325 Main St. January 28, 2016 marked the 100th anniversary of women getting the right to vote in Manitoba. Nellie McClung's leadership in the women's suffrage movement helped women win the vote in Manitoba elections in 1916. Manitoba was the first province where women were permitted to vote and hold office.

A bronze bust of Nellie McClung was constructed by artist Helen Granger-Young. Nellie started her career as a teacher in the Manitou area and married local druggist, Wes McClung. The couple lived in Manitou until 1911. A plaque on the face of the granite pedestal gives the history of Nellie McClung and her life here in Manitou.





LOG CABIN TOURIST CENTRE

Located at the corner of PTH 3 and Main Street in Manitou you will find the "Log House" Tourism Centre. The house was built in 1884 in what is believed to be the CPR style. A committee of volunteers moved and restored the building in a turn of the century style with donated furnishings. The building is open to the public seasonally from July 1st until the second weekend in September.

MANITOU GAS HOUSE

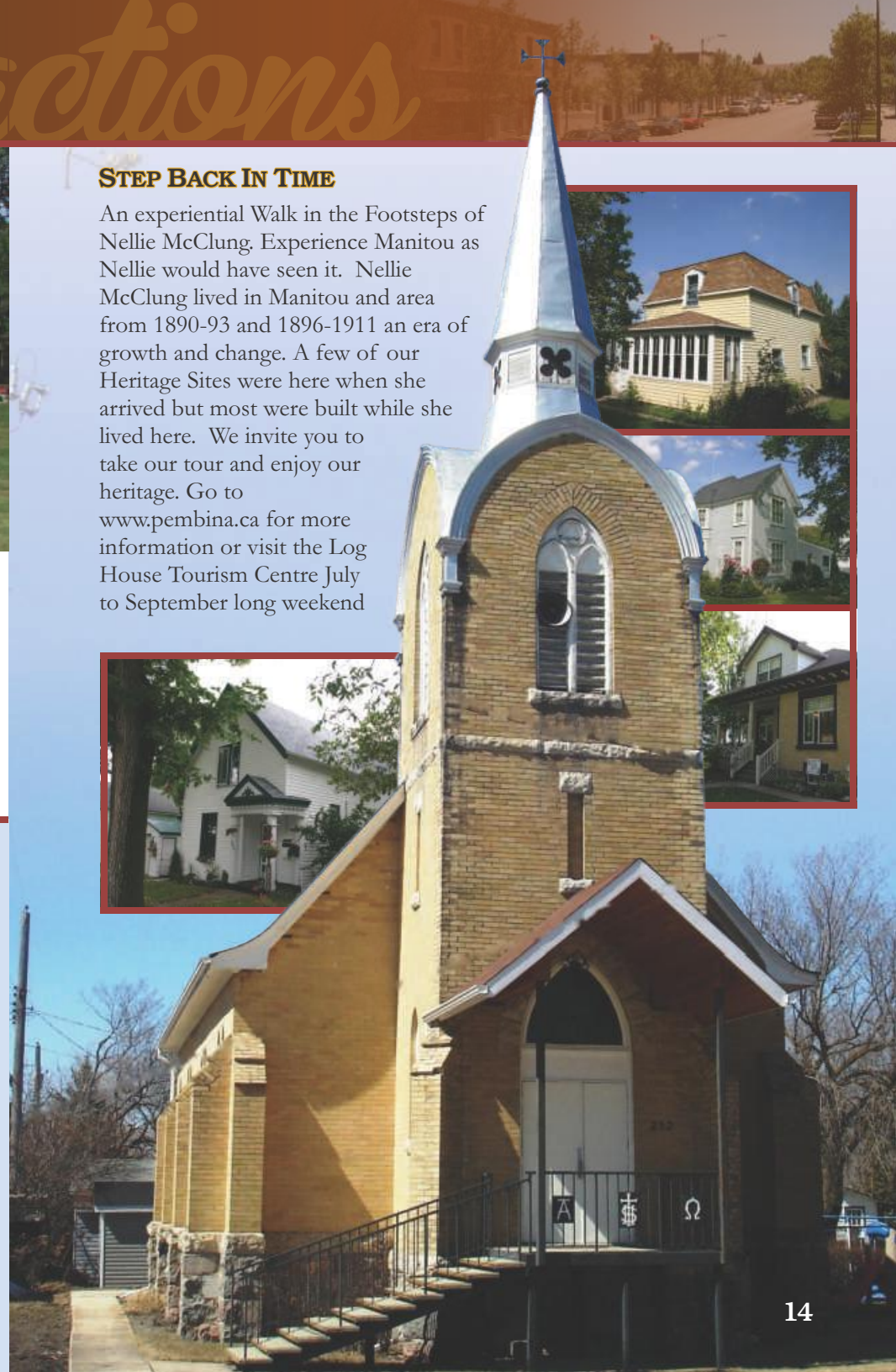
Manitou Gas House (408 Carrie Street, Manitou)

This is one of the best surviving examples in Manitoba of a gas house, where flammable acetylene gas was produced for home and business lighting around the Town of Manitou using pellets of calcium carbide mixed with water. When hydroelectric power was brought here in 1927, the gas house was no longer needed so it was renovated into a private residence. The building still contains the large, circular vat where the gas was generated.



STEP BACK IN TIME

An experiential Walk in the Footsteps of Nellie McClung. Experience Manitou as Nellie would have seen it. Nellie McClung lived in Manitou and area from 1890-93 and 1896-1911 an era of growth and change. A few of our Heritage Sites were here when she arrived but most were built while she lived here. MANITOU SWIMMING POOL

Manitou Swimming Pool is a fabulous place to cool off in the summer, and a great place to take swimming lessons! Our pool is junior olympic (25m) size in the main pool area with an integrated wading pool and zero depth beach entry. We have three waterslides "The Little Dipper", "The Twister" 120 foot flume slide, and the "The Plunge" which is a side by side rocket slide. There is a large grass deck area to spread out and relax and 2 large shade structures to help keep cool on those hot summer days. The pool is open seven days a week from mid June to early September.



MANITOU TOWN & COUNTRY GOLF COURSE

Located at 132 PTH 3, Manitou, MB. Manitou Town & Country Community Golf Course is open seasonally to the public. The nine hole licensed golf course is challenging and well maintained. Drop in and play a round anytime! We are pleased to be just finishing construction of a brand new clubhouse that will be ready for the 2016 Season!



MANITOU COMMUNITY ARENA

As the hub of the community during the hockey season and beyond, Manitou Arena is very proud of their multi-use facility. While the skating/hockey season is our primary use, we were very pleased to unveil a huge renovation in 2012 of a newly designed waiting room area. This area not only offers the greatest and most comfortable viewing of what's happening on the ice surface but it also doubles as our community hall. With a seating capacity of 240 and a complete kitchen facility, many weddings, family reunions, socials and other community events can be held in this area. The added off season revenue helps to support the arena and keeps us able to offer skating/hockey programs to our youth from Squirts to OldTimers! FISHING & HUNTING

SNOWMOBILING

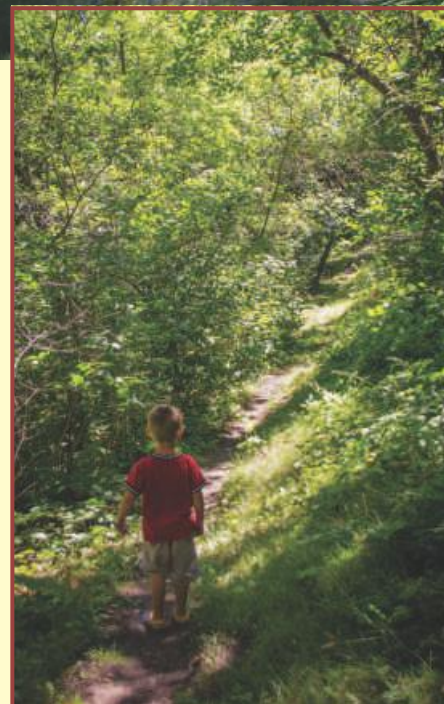

BINNEY NATURE PRESERVE

Located two miles west and two miles north of Manitou. This 30 acre site consists of two parcels of wooded and open grassland areas divided by a stream and marshland. A 100-foot floated boardwalk connects the two pieces of land. There are about three kms of hiking trails (color coded for trail distances) designed in loops so you can walk part or all of them. The site and trails are limited wheelchair accessible, and provide restroom access and picnic/rest area.

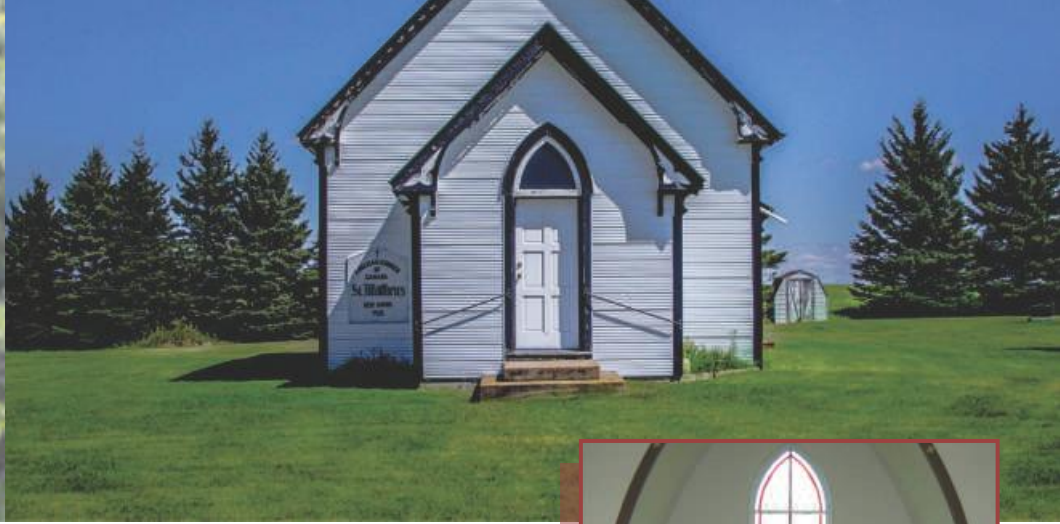

PEMBINA VALLEY PROVINCIAL PARK

Located adjacent to the Pembina Valley Bible Camp off PTH 31.

The scenic Pembina Valley is one of the most beautiful areas in southern Manitoba and is home to thousands of species of plants and animals. HY-WIRE ZIP-LINE ADVENTURES

Located 8 miles south on PR 528, follow the signs, turn right (west) for 1 mile and then turn left (south) and follow " the long and winding road" into the valley. Turn right at 1st driveway. Civic address is 46114 Mile 4N. Come and take the plunge: run, jump and dive off a platform with a 150 ft drop zipping across the trees, or sit, relax and feel like a bird as you zip-line across the ravines with breathtaking views of the Pembina Valley. ST. MATTHEWS NEW HAVEN

Located on the northwest corner of 15-4-8W. Many loyal pioneers of the New Haven district, who came here to make their homes, lived under very strenuous conditions. These early settlers felt the need of a "House of Worship". In the beginning, people got together in homes, then in schools to worship the Lord.



On Feb. 17, 1895 Rev. N. Hewitt, incumbent of Manitou and R.D. of Dufferin held his first service in the New Haven School. Under Rev. Hewitt's influence the Parish of St. Matthews New Haven was formed on May 27, 1897. With the formation of St. Matthews Parish, the district began fundraising and donating towards the church. Many box socials and concerts were held in the school to raise money. The community farmers also donated money towards building their church.

From the Record of Services 1895-1915 records show, Feb. 14, 1895 we held our first church service as the "Parish of St. Matthew's". Rev Hewitt held the service, twenty people were present, and collection was 60 cents. On Nov. 13, 1905 W.J. Rowe held the last service in the New Haven school. There were 44 present and collection of \$1.55. Nov. 20, 1905, W.J. Rowe, also attended by the Bishop, had the first service in St. Matthews New Haven Church. Attending were 45 people, collection \$1.75.

ST. LUKE'S PEMBINA CROSSING

Location: From the junction of PTH 3 and PR 244, head south approximately 5.5 miles, then west approximately 1 mile to the church.

Welcome to St Luke's Pembina Crossing Anglican Church and Cemetery. In the early 1880s, several families settled near the place where the Boundary Commission of 1873 had crossed the Pembina River.

In 1885, these pioneers established the Parish of St. Luke's Pembina Crossing. Originally, Church of England (Anglican) services were held directly across the road from this site in the Valley Stopping House.

After the Pembina Valley School was built in 1885, services were held there until 1886. The picturesque poplar log building, originally a general store built in May 1880, was in use until 1920 when it was replaced by a new building which opened on 26 September 1920. The following year, by an unfortunate accident, it burned down although most of the furniture and fittings were saved. In 1922, it was replaced by the present structure, a municipally-designated historic site as of 2011.



ST. MARY'S KALEIDA CHURCH

Location: From PTH 3, west of Darlingford, turn south on PR 528. Watch for sign on the west.

The little church of St. Mary's at Kaleida was built in 1892 in memory of the Hon. William Winram. Mr. Winram came from Ulverston, England and settled in the Riverdale district, south of the town of Manitou. He was elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1878 and sat as a member for 13 years. He was Speaker of the House for three years.

Upon Mr. Winram's death in 1891 the parishioners of the Riverdale congregation decided to erect an Anglican church in memory of him and they canvassed for funds.

It was named St. Mary's after the parish church of the Winram family in England. Built of natural field stone of red, black and grey with stone buttresses at each corner, it looks like a small country church that would fit into the rural countryside of England. The land slopes away to the east and south. Wild mauve crocus bloom in the spring. Yellow marigolds and bluebells reach up above the grass in summer.

Young men, trained in England as ministers, came to do missionary work in a new country. What a challenge it must have been travelling through the Pembina Valley holding services in all kinds of weather. In the winter they would go by team and sleigh and with horse and buggy in the summer. The homesteaders, too, must have had faith and confidence in this land and in the community they were building to leave such a lasting tribute.



MOWBRAY

Located at SE 14-01-08 W in the Municipality of Pembina. Mowbray School, a provincially designated heritage site, is a one-storey wood frame structure situated in the undulating landscape of the Pembina Valley. The provincial designation applies to the school and the grounds on which it stands.



The heritage value is highly significant, a rare surviving example in nearly pristine condition recalling the kinds of architectural and site qualities that often defined the experience of attending Manitoba's one-room schools from the late nineteenth century until about the middle of the twentieth century. Its small unadorned form and straightforward construction are typical of the type. Mowbray School's interior is also of great value: carefully preserved by local residents since the facility was closed in 1956, the school serves as a museum piece, complete with typical finishes and furnishings. Finally, the little building's situation, small and isolated on a broad expanse of flatland, visible most effectively from the slopes of the Pembina Valley to the south, recalls the determination and fortitude of those who taught and attended this school over the course of 50 years, and of their descendants, who continue to honour that experience with notable love and care.

HOLIDAY MOUNTAIN RESORT

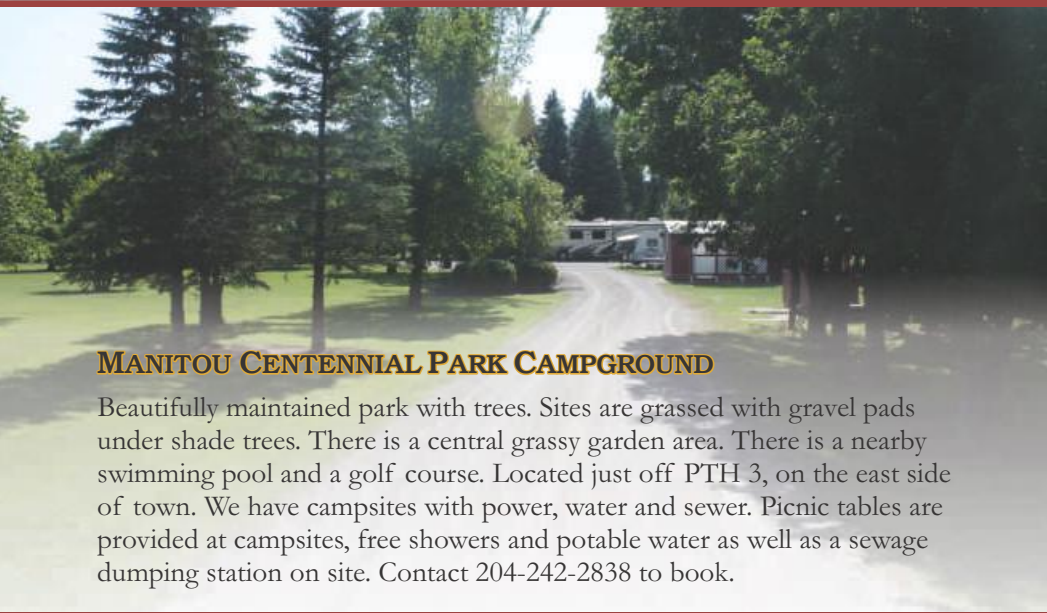

LA RIVIERE RAPTOR FESTIVAL

This annual event has grown by leaps and bounds each year! In 2016 almost 500 people attended the one day event to witness the spring raptor migration in the La Riviere area of the Pembina Valley.

The purpose of the festival is to bring awareness of the significance of the Pembina Valley as a migratory corridor for birds of prey and other birds through educational displays, guided walking tours and viewing migrating raptors with the help of experienced birders and ornithologists. It also highlights the importance of biodiversity and habitat conservation to ecosystem health.

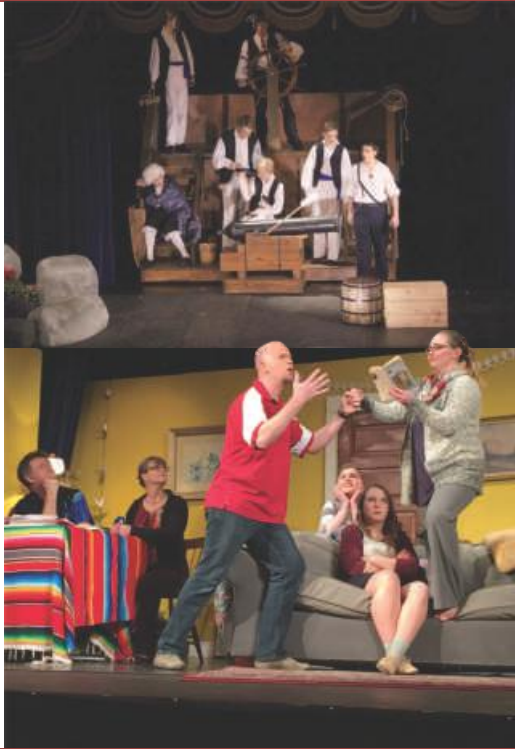
